#### School of Child Care Professionals

If you yearn to be involved in nurturing the next generation of young people, the School of Child Care Professionals is the place to begin. Gain the knowledge and skills required for state licensing and national childcare credentials while enjoying the personal experience of working directly with children.

Washtenaw Community College offers programs at several levels for students who want to begin new careers, or advance in their existing careers. The first level is the certificate, which can vary from nine to thirty-six credits, depending on the field. Certificates generally prepare students for entry-level jobs.

After completing a certificate, students can progress to the next level, the advanced certificate. The credit hours required for these programs also vary. This type of certificate provides a more specialized level of skill development, and often allows students to upgrade their positions at their places of employment.

The next level, an Associate in Applied Science, is available for some programs. For some career fields, it is possible to earn a certificate, advanced certificate, and an Associate in Applied Science degree in the same field. In these cases, the credit hours from the certificate and advanced certificate can be applied to the credit hours needed for the Associate in Applied Science degree.

## A. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This short-term certificate program prepares you to be assessed for the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential. The program includes the thirteen functional areas required by the National Council for Early Childhood Professional Recognition. Child Development Associate certified child care professionals are qualified to work with infants and toddlers, or preschoolers, in a child care center or in a family day care home.

#### **B. PROGRAM GOALS**

- To prepare students to pass the direct assessment for a Child Development Associate Credential.
- To prepare students for positions as child care professionals in pre-schools and day care centers.

#### C. NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The following information is from the Michigan Occupational Information System (MOIS, 1999).

Employment Outlook

Nationally in the last several years approximately 756,900 child care workers were employed. Employment is expected to grow faster than the average for all occupations through the year 2005 due to increasing number of preschool-age children with working mothers. There are about 23,525 child care workers employed in Michigan. Employment is expected to grow as fast as the average for all occupations through the year 2005. An average of 460 annual job openings will exist, with 210 due to growth and 250 needed to replace those who retire, die, or leave the labor force for other reasons.

As more women enter or re-enter the job market, the demand for child care employees will increase.

The Child Development Associate Credential is required by law for Michigan School Readiness Programs for three and four year olds. Many preschoolers and day care centers are requiring the CDA for Head Teacher/Caregiver positions or Assistant positions.

# Expected Earnings/Wages

Earnings for child care workers depends on the experience and education of the individual worker, the specific job, the type of child care facility, and the geographic location. Earnings tend to be higher in large centers and lower in church-affiliated centers. Earnings of self-employed caregivers vary even more than those of wage and salary workers, depending on the number of children for which they are responsible.

In Michigan, child care workers earned anywhere from \$10.71 to \$18.14 an hour depending on the specific job and where in Michigan they work.

#### D. ENROLLMENT PROJECTIONS

Estimated Number of Students per Year

Students have been preparing for the CDA Credential through WCC's Child Care courses since January 1993, but there has been no official method for recognizing it as a program. Enrollment that first semester was 11 students. The following chart shows current enrollment figures:

No additional resources are needed since courses are already being offered.

## F. COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

# CCP 122: Child Development Credentialing I

This course is designed to provide part of the formal training for students working toward their Child Development Associate Credential. During this course, students cover eight of the thirteen functional areas of the Child Development Associate (CDA) Competency Standards. Students participate in group seminar discussions and work on assigned observations and portfolio projects.

# CCP 123: Child Development Credentialing II

This course is a continuation of CCP 122 for students working on their Child Development Associate Credential. Five of the thirteen functional areas of the Child Development Associate (CDA) Competency Standards are covered. Students participate in group seminar discussions and work on assigned observations and portfolio projects.

# **CCP 124: CDA Assessment Preparation**

This course helps CDA candidates prepare for credential renewal or initial direct assessment. Students seeking the Child Development Associate credential for the first time should have completed the required hours of instruction and experience. Students seeking CDA recredentialing receive assistance with their professional development plan and preparation for reassessment.

# HSC 131: CPR/FPR and First Aid

This course teaches American Red Cross first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation for the professional rescuer (CPR/FPR). Students learn adult, child, and infant CPR, use of resuscitation masks and how to treat choking emergencies. Additional skills taught include emergency care of sudden illnesses, bleeding, thermal injuries and injuries to muscles, bones, and joints. Successful students earn ARC First Aid and CPR/FPR certification cards.

# G. ANALYSIS OF AFFECTED INSTRUCTIONAL UNITS

Additional time for part-time faculty to provide student supervision is desirable. Suggest half-time appointments rather than being paid per student.

#### H. ARTICULATIONS

This program prepares students for direct assessment for the national CDA Child Care credential. Currently we are transferring students directly into the two-year program, exempting the same courses that we would for high school articulation: CCW 118, 119, 108, and 110.

# LICENSURE/ACCREDITATION (IF APPLICABLE)

Graduates will be prepared to be assessed for the Child Development Associate Credential required by law for Michigan School Readiness Programs for three and four year olds. The program includes the thirteen functional areas required by the National Council for Early Childhood Professional Recognition.

#### Child Development (CDA) **Achievement Certificate**

This program prepares you for the assessment exam required for the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential and for employment in child care centers or in family home daycare settings working with infants and toddlers, or preschoolers.
